Students star in five-part series

AHS to be featured on PBS

American High School has been chosen to be part of a five-part documentary to be featured on the Public Broadcasting System (PBS) in March of 1989. "The MacNeil-Lehrer" report will focus on the differences between American high schools and high schools in Japan.

"AHS was picked because in many ways it is typical of high schools across America," said Christopher Ramsey, director of public affairs for MacNeill-Lehrer Productions in New York.

According to Ramsey, aside from the make-up of the student body, producers were also attracted to the name of the school. Film crews arrived at AHS in late October during Spirit Week. They captured many of the activities during the

week including the Homecoming Dance. During the filming, April Oliver, creative consultant for PBS, interviewed seniors Anthony Ramos and Carlos Herrera, and junior Amanda Hardy. Ramos, Herrera, and Hardy were featured because each one of them had a different goal

for the future. Ramos' main focus is on vocational education (body and fender repair) while Hardy plans on attending U. C. Berkeley. Herrera anticipates on attending a junior college. These students were followed by the camera's eye to show what their lives are like during a typical day at AHS.

According to Hardy, it was fun having the cameras follow her. "It was a unique experience, and I enjoyed working with them," she said.

Roger Mudd, commentator for the production indicated that the basic difference between U.S. high schools and those in Japan were that in Americans seemed to emphasize both education and activities while in Japan, only education was emphasized.

Digital Harmony lights up AHS

An assemblage of laser lights illuminated the AHS gym for a spectacular laser light concert on Wednesday, December 14 as students and staff watched in awe.

Science teacher Karen Fujii had arranged for Laser Fantasy, an organization based in Seattle, Washington, to present "Digital Harmony" at a school assembly. Snoopy & Woodstock, and Wyle E. Coyote who finally captured the elusive Road Runner.

Chuck Wahl, a laser technician during Wednesday's presentation, operated a computer generated laser image by their lab channels which interfaced with the

Information stored on a half inch tape directed the controls to a scanner, allowing the technician to draw the images, change the colors, enlarge or reduce figures, and make duplications.

science teacher Karen Fujii

Laser lights from all colors of the spectrum danced on a large white sheet [as a screen] and projected various shapes, synchronized with popular music.

"I've been to 16 laser shows. This was my 17th and I loved it-I really enjoy this stuff," said senior Ryan Torchia, who had aided the technician crew in setting up the equipment for the show.

The audience not only saw an array of shapes and colors but a segment dedicated to celebrated cartoon characters as well. The animations included Betty Boop,

"It (the laser concept) is highly concentrated. It's used for light, heat, energy, the applications are endless," said Wahl.

Fujii had just completed a unit on light and sound with her science classes and hired Laser Fantasy using the funds collected from the recycling of aluminum cans that students brought in for extra credit.

"They [the students] saw the principles of light and sound put to use," said Fujii.

"It was fascinating. It'd be nice to work with lasers," said freshman Robert Ward.

Japan vs. America

During a recent convention speech by columnist Jack Anderson, Stephen Collins, Assistant Superintendent of Instructional Services, found out some of the reasons that Japanese students may be doing better than Americans:

-Japan is, by our standards, a single society; the United States is pluralistic.

-Japan and the United States spend about the same per pupil on education.

 In Japan the family respects education and educators; in the U.S. generally money and power are respected.

-In Japan educational success is measured by knowledge; here, by a diploma.

-In Japan tough courses lead to knowledge and success; here, any course that leads to the diploma is fine.

-In Japan students are provided 280 days of school per year; here, it is 180 (plus a limited summer school).

If we took all of the minutes that a typical student in America attended school from kindergarten through grade 12 and ran those as continuous time, it would amount to about 14 months.

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





The following interview is part two of a three part series concerning an AHS student who has experienced the problems drug addiction.

In part two "Alice" will tell the American Express what it was like to live in a drug rehabilitation center and how the center provided her with the strength to over come her addiction.

Reporter: When you first started going to the center did you deny you had a 'rug problem?

Alice: No, I already knew. A lot of people have a denial about it, but not me.

Reporter: What was it like during the first few sessions?

Alice: It's real foggy "cause you're like, "What am I doing here?" Mainly they'd (the other kids) talked about their own problems. Then they'd ask you if you had anything to say.

Reporter: When did you start to open up to the group?

Alice: About five or six days later, I got to know my

roommate. It starts to get Reporter: routine. You're kinda comfortable but still nervous.

Reporter: How did the people who ran the center treat you?

Alice: Really nice. I got to know them and talk to them. You could talk to them a lot. They'd play games with you and

Reporter: So were you constantly supervised?

Alice: Yeah. constantly. But it wasn't like a prison or anything. The counselors were all prior drug addicts, six to twelve years ago. They knew what I was going through.

What were the other kids in the center like?

Alice: When I first got there most were real nice. They'd come up and talk to you since you didn't know them. Some were withdrawn. They'd deep to themselves.

Reporter: Did you have any forms of recreation?

Alice: A lot of times. It was what the counselors wanted to do. In the morning we took a walk, we did calisthetics if it was raining. At noon, for an hour, we'd play basketball or football.

Reporter: How long was it before you noticed a change in your attitude?

Alice: About two weeks 'cause there were certain steps you had to complete-like homework. If a person did the work, something would happen. The homework was basically about yourself, your life.

Reporter: What exactly did the center teach you about yourself and drugs?

Alice: It taught me what drugs do to you, and how to live life without using them.

After losing most of their preseason games, the AHS girls varsity soccer team has built a 2-0 MVAL record.


