SUPREME COURT RULES, "STUDENTS LOSE RIGHTS!"

By a vote of 6-3 the U.S. Supreme Court dangerously weakened the 4th Amendment of the Constitution.

How? You may ask: Now teachers and administrators can search your purse, handbags, pockets, locker, or anywhere on campus WITHOUT PROBABLE CAUSE! (Probable cause is any reasonable belief of suspicion to take action). The 4th Amendment clearly states "The right if the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and belongings, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated... without probable cause." But, the new ruling states : A search of a student by a teacher of other school official will be justified at its inception (when the idea "pops" into their heads) when search will provide evidence that a student has violated of is violating either the law or

'Probable cause' not needed

the rules of the school." This means that they don't need "probable cause".

Mr. Tranchina, principal of A.H.S. had this to say:

"We want to protect the school population from dangerous substances and objects, it would be unreasonable for a teacher or administrator to search for anything else."

But the Supreme Court ruling gives them the right to search for any contraband (including walkman's, radios and cigarettes.)

Police, who are trained in search and seizure procedures must have "probable cause" to get a warrant to search. But, a mere first year American Studies teacher can have you "Up Against The Wall", going through your pockets or purse for no apparent reason (he may smell cigarette smoke on your clothes). Most teachers are not trained in search and seizure procedures (but they don't have to be trained, the law gives them the right to search, without probable cause!)

According to Mr. Morrow, American Studies teacher, "A law such as this, revoking student rights is necessary considering today's conditions in some schools." Mr. Jones, a social science teacher, summed it all up when he said, "Students have no

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, howes, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath, or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the person or things to be seized.

—Fourth Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted December 15, 1791.

rights!" And it is true, we lose our rights as citizens and humans when we step on our campus. Mr. Smith, a math teacher agreed, "I don't think teachers have the right to search students, with or without probable cause." Mr. Tranchina stated,

"I think the ruling is going to be abused, there are going to be unreasonable people doing unreasonable searches...every major Supreme Court ruling is jested within it's first year... This one should be interesting."

Is this the beginning of a new trend? will everyone's constitutional rights be revoked in the name of public safety? I refuse to trade in my rights as a U.S. citizen. This ruling is completely unconstitutional! A search without a reason? Welcome, to the new totalitarian America!

Mr. Tranchina says - that if he were ever given the opportunity to work at another achool, he would have to consider many factors. He still feels the need to continue development of American High. He says, "If the challenge of a new assignment was significantly greater than the challenge that is still here at American, then I would have to weigh that factor."




their first In Krahl Joanne game scored two goals and Kristy Tobeck.knocked in one as the team beat Newark Memorial


