

May, 1984: Again it was mucho funno! But then again--we had a rotunda then!



June, 1985: Senior Show. Should at least win a Tony! (Has anyone seen Karyn Ho?!?!)


Well, that about wraps it up.





SAMMY SOOD



TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD


