DAYS OF DISCOVERY

Many of you may have already heard about the trial schedules we will be experiencing during the remainder of the second semester. Whatever you may have already heard, here are some facts which may help you to understand what is happening.

Now that we have adjusted to our new school, it is time for the experiementation to begin. The first real experiment to take place is in the time scheduling of classes. The first of three changes will begin this coming Monday and last for the following three weeks.

This first change, known as the Rotation Schedule, will try to discover what happens to your learning if the old periods are longer by twenty minutes or shorter by twenty minutes. How do these changes in time of meeting affect the learning which takes place?

The students, parents, staff, and maintainance personnel will be asked at the end of the experiment to evaluate just what has happened and whether or not it was a change for the better.

We can not do this job alone. We must have your help and support.




